## Sheriff Ian Parkinson's Message

**Election Time.** As many of you know, we are in election time. It is hard to believe that I have been in office for three years. I guess time flies when you are having fun. The good news is that I am officially running unopposed. I give full credit for this to the people around me. We have excellent men and woman at the Sheriff's Office, including all of our volunteers. I must also separately recognize Sheriff Advisory Foundation Members. All of you have gone above and beyond to support the Sheriff's Office and me. The many projects that all of you have supported have made us successful. We adopted a slogan a

couple of years ago to "lead the way." Over the last two years all of you have made this slogan reality. I feel very fortunate to be in this position and very proud of what we all have accomplished.

**Women's jail project.** We continue to be very busy. The most notable project is the new female jail. Construction began almost one month ago. Even though you cannot see signs of the building yet there is a lot going on behind the scenes. Because the building is actually separate from the existing jail, separate water and sewer lines must be run. The elevation must also be raised, which requires a lot of specialized work. The first half of this project will take approximately 17 months and the overall project is expected to take approximately three years. Special thanks to Chief Rob Reid, Captain

Michelle Cole, Correction Deputy Tim Meinhold, and the construction team.

In addition to this project, construction has begun on the replacement of the laundry building at the Honor Farm. As you recall, this building burnt down approximately 18 months ago. The new building is a little larger than the previous one and will actually have solar panels that will help reduce our electricity bill. Once complete, this building will house our laundry facility and bicycle repair shop.

**Budget Update.** We are in the middle of budget time. I am happy to report that the economy continues to improve and that we will not experience any reductions this year. As a matter of fact, we will actually be adding a Coroner Sergeant position. This position was eliminated several years ago as a result of the economy. With the opening of the

new off sight Coroners Office, that SAF helped make possible, the need to have this position restored was a priority for me. The future challenge that we have will be intelligent planned rebuilding. This is not the time to grow government because the budget is better, but rather develop a plan that restores vital services that will make the residents safer. My focus will be patrol Deputies. We have a very large territory to patrol and I have some specific ideas how to provide better coverage with minimal fiscal impacts.

*It has been exciting to watch the membership growth of SAF. I believe that this is because of the positive and professional work of the SAF Board. Thank you on behalf of the Sheriff's Office for the support.*

# Women's Jail Begins Construction

On the misty afternoon of February 7, 2014, the Sheriff's Honor Guard, accompanied by a piper, heralded the groundbreaking ceremony for the long awaited new women's jail for San Luis Obispo.

Sheriff Ian Parkinson spoke of the longtime dream to build a facility that would not only properly house female inmates, but also provide them with education, rehabilitation, and medical care.

The initial design began in 2006. An AB900 funding grant provided the \$25 million necessary to construct it, and the San

Luis Obispo County board of supervisors approved the project in 2013.

Dignitaries, representing the Sheriff's Office, the county board of supervisors, the county administration, and the CEO of the bid-winning construction company wielded golden shovels to ceremoniously dig into the soil that will bear the new facility slated to be ready for occupation in October 2016.

SAFSLO board members, Sylvia Dodd and Sam Scarbrough and wife, Mary, witnessed the dedication, along with a sizeable crowd of staff, visitors and media.

# Preparedness Expo 2014

The lively morning began with a line around the corner and down the block from the San Luis Obispo Veterans' Hall as hundreds of county citizens streamed through the doors and around the exterior to the 2014 Preparedness Expo on March 29.

Children and adults eagerly circled fire engines, police cars, the Sheriff's Humvee, and a drug-confiscated Viper, only a few of the emergency vehicles that agencies displayed in the area surrounding the building.

Inside, the San Luis Obispo Sheriff's Advisory Foundation staffed a table filled with information about the organization's function. They passed out materials to adults and paper badges to the children, educating the public about what we do to support the Sheriff. The board was represented by **Sylvia Dodd, Dan Cashier, Mary and Sam Scarbrough, James Hunt, Marshall Klein, Kathleen Martinelli, Brian Duvall, Hal Griffin, and Randy Arseneau**

The Expo was packed with agencies and businesses dedicated to helping the public prepare for and cope with emergencies and disasters. Tasers crackled and trained dogs trotted through their paces as personnel demonstrated their products from emergency food supplies to self-defense tools. United Way and the Red Cross shared information, as did local hospitals and the Civil Air Patrol.

In a side room, **Sheriff Parkinson** talked about the county's plans to enhance preparedness, saying the motto is to make ours the best-prepared county in the nation. Utilizing funds from a PG&E grant, the Sheriff and other leaders will continue to educate the public on how to prepare for emergencies and to train volunteers throughout the county to mobilize and assist.

# Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Update

- Understanding and performing search & rescue techniques
- Working with first responder agencies and related government & volunteer groups
- Understanding and responding to terrorism

**ACCOMPLISHMENTS:** We have delivered 47 classes training just over 1400 students. Two CERT Teams have been established, Cambria and North County, and a new team, Estero Bay, is being reconstituted under the guidance of retired Morro Bay/Santa Maria Fire Chief Jeff Jones. Retired CAL FIRE B/C John Gibson has designed and installed a CERT radio channel and system that covers all of SLO County.

**GOALS:** Working with a variety of funding sources, we are in the process of outfitting a number of CERT trailers that cache tools and equipment for various Teams.

We are in the process of establishing a steering committee so that a more effective countywide approach to CERT is in place, understanding that each community will maintain its own program, funding and identity. Benefits would include:

- Cooperatively apply for regionally based grant funding and equipment
- Develop a more coordinated approach to program delivery, advertising, shared instructors, and communications
- Enhance coordination, training, and accountability of CERT members between the various programs
- Allow for independent programs designed to meet specific communities' needs

**VOAD:** Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster. This organization promotes communication, cooperation, coordination, and collaboration among community organizations, faith-based groups, and government agencies with the goal of streamlining service delivery to people affected by disasters. One of the goals of this program is to better coordinate the Spontaneous Unaffiliated Volunteers (SUV) that come forward after every major disaster. Planning is currently under way to develop a number of Disaster Volunteer Centers throughout the County. CERT trained citizens, not associated with a team, would be a valuable asset at these centers.

**HISTORY:** In 2003 Sheriff Pat Hedges and retired SLO City Fire Chief Bob Neumann approached the Fire Chiefs Association and Sheriffs Advisory Council regarding the sponsorship of a county regional CERT Program. The Advisory Council and the Association agreed to a sponsorship with the Council acting as the fiduciary agent for the program.

**PROGRAM:** Community Emergency Response TRAINING or TEAM, CERT is designed to train the public to better function in emergencies and disasters. CERT is standardized training (FEMA), initially of about 20 hours, classroom & practical performance. CERT teaches:

- Individuals learn how to be more “self-reliant” during emergencies of different kinds
- Understanding when & how to shut utilities at home or at places of business
- Performing disaster first aid
- Shelter in place and survive for 72 hours or more in an emergency or disaster
- Being capable of minor firefighting and recognizing how to plan for major fires
- Learning about hazardous materials

# *Grand Jury Report Recommends Expanding County Crime Lab*

The San Luis Obispo County Sheriff's Office is doing a good job operating and maintaining the new coroner's facility since it moved to a new location in August 2012, a recently released grand jury report said.

However, the forensic crime lab housed at the main campus on Kansas Avenue is small and overcrowded, and efficiency may be improved by also moving to a new and larger location, the jury found.

In investigating the Sheriff's Office's crime lab and coroner's facility, grand jurors toured both facilities in December, escorted by detectives and administrative staff, and conducted interviews with Sheriff Ian Parkinson.

In the report, released March 27, titled "Forensic Investigations in San Luis Obispo County: The SLO County Crime Lab, the SLO County Coroner's Office," the grand jury noted that the new coroner's office and morgue on the 800 block of Aerovista Place in San Luis Obispo remains financially efficient close to two years since the move.

Prior to August 2012, the county leased facilities in a private mortuary in Los Osos, contracting with a private Central Valley pathologist to conduct autopsies.

Operating costs such as rent and cleaning for the new facility are equal to what the county historically paid to contract out services.

The new 2,600-square-foot consolidated coroner's office includes an administrative office, a cooler, an autopsy room, an evidence room housing an evidence dryer and refrigerator-heater, a sexual investigation room and a forensic investigation room, as well as a viewing room.

"Locating all facilities that support the coroner in one location appears to have resulted in more efficient procedures," the report reads.

According to state law, all deaths occurring outside of a hospital and all cases involving homicides, suicides, accidental deaths, suspicious deaths, and any case involving the death of people under the age of 18 must be investigated by the coroner's office.

In 2013, the coroner's office had 1,385 reportable deaths throughout the county and responded to 602 cases, a nine percent increase from the previous year. Of those cases, 254 required an investigation, and 165 required an autopsy.

The grand jury's assessment of the Sheriff's Office's forensic crime lab, however, was not as glowing. Jurors found the lab—which includes a fingerprint and fiber analysis lab, a trace and imaging lab, and a chemical and toxicology lab—is located in a building that houses other sheriff's offices and is very tight on space.

The jury noted that minor changes in layout to add a new lab increased overcrowding and suggested that expanding the lab or moving to an altogether new location would enhance productivity.

The new Driving Under the Influence Lab is still being installed, according to the report. DUI testing currently is outsourced and results can take three weeks. The inhouse lab could cut that time to less than a week.

The Sheriff's Office is scheduled to present a response to the report to the county board of supervisors on Tuesday. Grand jury recommendations are not binding and the county is not required by law to follow them.

## HISTORICAL ARTICLE

### "PIO LINARES, PAST AND PRESENT"

According to the History of San Luis Obispo County, Pio Linares along with Jack Powers were two of the most notorious and dastardly criminals in the San Luis Obispo 164 year history.

They were implicated in several serious crimes from San Juan Capistrano to San Miguel and beyond, as well as locally. One of the most noted crimes was the murder of two Frenchmen and the theft of their livestock near San Miguel in the mid 1850's.

As the investigation into the murders progressed, law enforcement, and citizens began to piece together a horrendous trail of murder and theft perpetrated by the Powers/Linrares gang which littered the California Countryside with the bodies of innocent victims for their belongings or just for "fun."

Finally in 1858, the citizens of the county had captured and executed by hanging, most of the members of the gang except for Jack Powers, Pio Linares and three other miscreants. In the final resolution to the saga, Captain J. Wilson and about 30 men fell in pursuit of Linares and his companions and located them in a stand of woods at a nearby San Luis Obispo rancho. The Captain's group surrounded the wood and began to take rifle fire from the surrounded criminals which wounded several members of the group. They returned fire.

After a siege throughout the night, the vigilante group charged the wood and in the ensuing fire fight killed Pio Linares and wounded one other man who was taken into custody. The Powers/Linares gang was finished, although Jack Powers escaped to Arizona. It was later learned that Powers was slain by Yaqui Indians and his horses stolen, fittingly ending his life the way he had ended others under the same circumstances.

That was Pio Linares, Past. What about the Present? Today, the Pio Linares hacienda still exists and is located in the northeast corner of the City of San Luis Obispo. It is owned and inhabited by a local doctor and has been the family home for many decades. In an interview with the daughter of the doctor, it was learned that other than a few modernizations such as baths, modern kitchen, electricity and central heating, the house is much as it was during the time Linares lived there. She also revealed that the house is "haunted".

It seems that at odd times, doors will slam when no one is around to shut them and that on occasion when family members enter a room there is a strange presence felt as if someone is standing near. So far, the ghost has not menaced the family and is more like an impish poltergeist!

## **Public Safety Telecommunications Week**

The San Luis Obispo County Board of Supervisors will issue a resolution to designate April 13 through April 19 as "San Luis Obispo County National Public Safety Telecommunications Week." This resolution recognizes the important and vital work performed by public safety dispatchers in the Sheriff's Office and County Fire. On average, Sheriff's Dispatchers answer 3,268 9-1-1 calls a month. County Fire Dispatchers field an average of 257 calls a month. The resolution honors public safety dispatchers for providing "that vital link between the citizen or victim and the public safety provider who may apprehend a criminal, save or recover their possessions, save their life or the life of a loved one."

## **School Threat**

On 3-21-14, the San Luis Obispo County Sheriff's Office responded to a report of a verbal threat that was made against the students and staff at Creston Elementary School. The threat was left on the school's answering machine. The threat was assessed and appropriate resources responded to the school campus and surrounding area. The investigation determined the threat was generalized and was not directed in any way to a specific individual. Detectives were able to determine who made the phone call and a juvenile was detained and turned over to the San Luis Obispo County Juvenile Services Division. No one was injured in this incident.

## **Recovered Property**

On 3-31-14, San Luis Obispo County Sheriff's Deputies responded to a report of stolen property that had been recovered from a series of auto break-ins that had occurred over the previous few days in the Los Osos area. Based on their investigation, Deputies arrested two juveniles ages 14 and 16 for grand theft and possession of stolen property. Deputies were able to recover more than two dozen items believed to be stolen from those vehicles including cameras, iPods, credit cards and backpacks. The Sheriff's Office is now asking anyone who reported anything stolen from their vehicle during that time and in that area to stop by the Sheriff's Coast Station to claim their property. That facility is located at 2099 10th Street in Los Osos.

## **Phone Scam**

The San Luis Obispo County Sheriff's Office is warning of a phone scam that is making its way through the County. Several people have called us recently to report they had been contacted by someone claiming to be from the Sheriff's Office and warning there was a warrant out for their arrest because they failed to appear for jury duty. The caller indicates the resident can clear the warrant by making arrangements to give them a \$1,000 pre-paid debit card or making a \$1,000 wire transfer. We want to warn residents these calls have no connection to the San Luis Obispo County Sheriff's Office. The Sheriff's Office reminds you that it is not our practice to contact residents by phone regarding these matters. Anyone who receives a call like this should report it to their local law enforcement agency.

## **Strong Wind Event**

On 4-1-14, a strong wind event occurred on the grounds of Camp San Luis Obispo. The wind event created a path of damage that included a set of wooden stairs and a 30-foot set of bleachers that were picked up and carried by the wind and destroyed, a 20-foot connex (large metal cargo container) that was moved approximately 12 feet and flipped, and severe damage to trees, fencing, a communications pole and a cell tower. No one was injured. This wind event may have been the result of a possible downburst, which is a meteorological term which indicates winds that are directed downward and then outward, contrary to a tornado in which the winds are moving inward and upward.
