Sometimes the people behind the scenes, supporting the front line, can get forgotten or over looked. From a dispatcher and a correc-


tional technician, to SAF, we are truly not whole without everybody's assistance.

Bicycle Program	\$3,792	The annual Christmas Bicycle Give-A-Way Program continues to be a very successful community outreach program where the Sheriff's Office helps underprivileged children. Purchased miscellaneous supplies and parts to fix bikes and 280 helmets to be given away with the bikes.
Cessna 182 Aircraft - Repairs & Upgrades	\$32,165	The Sheriff's Office received a Cessna 182 fixed wing aircraft from the San Bernardino Sheriff's Office. Purchased a replacement engine and the labor for the installation of the engine.
Gang Resistance Education & Training (GREAT) Program	\$1,875	This request was to fund the 50% balance due for the production of a video which can be used by the Sheriff when he requests funds from the SLO County Board of Supervisors for the Sheriff's Youth Summer Camps. In addition, the video can be used by those coordinating the camps to solicit funds for sponsorships. The video could also be used in the schools to promote the camps to students and their parents. The camps are part of a violence prevention program taught by trained law enforcement officers. The summer camps provide fun activities and games while teaching children how to avoid taking part in bullying, violence, drugs and gangs. They encourage kids to make responsible choices in their lives.
Gang Task Force	\$442	Purchased 100 Gang Task Force (GTF) Unit Patches. Sheriff Ian Parkinson recently authorized the adoption of a Gang Task Force (GTF) Unit Patch. The symbolism of the patch embodies our motto, concerted effort and tradition. The patch has been authorized to be worn on our entry and tactical patrol vest. A patch will also be distributed to each of the past members of the unit that have helped in keeping this county from being over run by gang members and gang activity. The patches will be retained by the GTF unit sergeant to ensure accountability and control over the distribution of the patches.

Annual May Fun-Raiser	\$3,677	<p>Our annual fundraiser continues to be successful each year with the support received by our members and guests who attend the event. As we have done in past years, the Sheriff's Advisory Foundation gives special thanks to Bruce Breault, Tunny Ortali and Toney Breault of McLintocks Saloon and Dining House for their many years of continuous support. Each year they have donated their facility and services and obtained donations from their food suppliers for the food served.</p> <p>Expense items purchased include invitations, equipment rental, auction paddles, labor for food preparers, server tips and other miscellaneous items.</p>
Sheriff's Office Task Force (PG&E Emergency Preparedness)	\$14,697	<p>To provide funds for the Sheriff's Office Task Force (on Public Safety Public Relations) agreement with United Way of San Luis Obispo. Funds utilized to support its San Luis Obispo Voluntary Organizations in Disaster (SLOVOAD) program and 211 program material. The purpose is to make San Luis Obispo County the most prepared county in the nation for disaster preparedness. Donation of \$12,000 was given to United Way of SLO County for the Free, confidential 211 calls that are answered by knowledgeable, bilingual call specialists who provide 24-hour referrals and support to those in need of health and human services. Callers are given referrals for each need they present; this could include food, shelter, health care, transportation, or information pertaining to a local disaster. Calls to this non-emergency number reduce the number of inappropriate calls to 911 and other public safety offices. Individuals and families are connected with important services and programs, giving them the support they need to be productive and healthy community members.</p>
Sheriff's Family Day	\$8,120	<p>Annually, thousands of people attend the event which is free to people of all ages. Its purpose is to give the residents in our community an opportunity to meet law enforcement and public safety personnel as they display their equipment and perform demonstrations. Educational material is provided to help the public to obtain a better understanding of the law enforcement and public safety services available to them and ways to protect themselves against crime and injury. Also, it offers those who are considering public service as a career the chance to speak with other people who are already doing the job. Event expenses are for T-shirts, hot dogs, soft drinks and memorabilia given away to children under 12, and advertising, equipment rentals, and other miscellaneous items.</p>
Sheriff's Office - Other	\$1,249	<p>Funding for three rental passenger vehicles, fuel and cost for each vehicle to transport participants in the Baker2 Vegas Relay. This relay is the most "positive" event offered to law enforcement officers today. It promotes physical fitness which benefits performance on duty. The premise of the race is to build teamwork, camaraderie, promote physical fitness, and participate in good spirited competition. This is the first time in 16 years that the Sheriff's Office has participated in this event.</p>

SLSO-K-9 Unit	\$10,643	<p>Funding provided for the Sheriff's K-9 Unit in keeping with the Sheriff's priorities for additional K-9 tracking training. This three day training course was provided by Navy Seal K-9 Team Operator Mike Ritland from Trikos International. The training will give the K-9 handlers a full understanding of the K-9's tracking abilities from classroom basics to advanced urban and rural tracking. Tracking is probably the weakest area for our K-9 teams and this training will help to improve it greatly. Plans are to send the K-9 teams through a specialized training class each year to build on the handler's basic training and give the team's the confidence and knowledge to complete all of the tasks needed to better serve the community.</p> <p>Purchased 72 Mugs and 246 T-Shirts to sell at the K-9 fundraiser and throughout the year.</p>
Sheriff's Mounted Posse	\$1,030	<p>Purchased an award buckle for the outgoing Posse Captain for volunteer service, seven pairs of reflective leg wraps for the Posse horses, and 24 head stall concho for ceremonial functions.</p>
Service Awards	\$2,116	<p>Purchased and presented 68 Years of Service Pins from 5 to 30 years of service for the Sheriff's Office personnel.</p>
Women's Honor Farm	\$450	<p>Purchased quilt batting for the Women's Honor Farm Sewing Program to be utilized for its ongoing sewing projects which are donated back to our community.</p>
Search & Rescue	\$3,412	<p>Purchase of three Type 1 completion search packs. Search and Rescue (SLOSAR) is in the process of developing a Type 1 search team. This team is a specialized team that consists of the most fit and skilled members of the SLOSAR team. Six members of the SLOSAR team will test and be available to respond to the requests of California Office of Emergency Services' request for Type 1 mutual aid. Each Type 1 searcher will maintain the basic search equipment required by the SLOSAR team, but additional specialized equipment is required for the Type 1 Searcher. It is the intention of SLOSAR to maintain three Type 1 completion search packs which will be used by any of the six Type 1 Searcher based on availability to respond to a mutual aid Type 1 request.</p> <p>Purchased personalized pencils and Skywalker Compasses with Whistles and Lanyards. These items are given to children to encourage their engagement with the Search and Rescue Volunteers. Search and Rescue attends numerous public events to publicize the SLO Sheriff's Search and Rescue Team. These events include but are not limited to Law Enforcement Night at the SLO Fanner's Market, Sheriff's Day at the Ranch, Emergency Preparedness Fair, and G.R.E.A.T. Camps.</p>
Search & Rescue - Meadows	\$1,176	<p>Purchased three replacement medical packs. Search and Rescue provides "medical standby" for public events such as triathlons, bike races, and holiday weekends at Oceano Dunes, etc. During the course of these events, the members drive ATV's supplied with medical equipment that may be needed during an emergency. These supplies are currently stored in a nylon pack which are several years old and are showing extreme wear.</p>

Community Emergency Response Team -Cambria (CERT)	\$1,950	Conducted two CERT training classes and field exercises, outfitted students with gear bags, equipped the CERT trailer and students, and provided Team Members with ID Cards vests.
SLO County Cattlemen's & Cattlewomen's Associations	\$1,334	Purchased two Commemorative Belt Buckles which were presented to the Cattleman and Cattlewomen of the year. Presentation builds stronger working relationships between the Sheriff's Office and our rural community partners. Funding from SAF supports the Sheriff's Office's on-going efforts to build stronger community partners which enhance our law enforcement services in the rural areas of our County.
SLOFIST, Inc - Fire Investigation Training	\$2,000	The Sheriff's Coroner Unit and the San Luis Obispo Fire Investigation Strike Team co-sponsored a Forensic Fire Death Investigation Class which held in June 2016. This course provides training to investigators from all over the country, Canada and even Europe. The funds were used to offset the total cost of security fencing for the training site located adjacent to Cuesta College. Specifically, the funds were used for fencing construction and materials necessary for security during the course of the class.

## *Tax-Free IRA Donations to our Endowment Fund*

Individuals 70-1/2 years old or older can donate up to \$100,000.00 per year to a qualified charity (S.A.F). This donation is a 100% above the line deduction. A transfer directly to the charity gives 100% of the money to the charity.

If IRA distributions go to individuals, the money distributed is taxed as income to the individual.

You can direct your yearly Mandatory Required Distribution (MRD) to a charity (S.A.F) and 100% goes tax-free to the charity and you have a taxable write off.

You can name the **Sheriff's Advisory Foundation** as a beneficiary and, upon your death, 100% of the money goes to our foundation.

Remember, donations to the endowment are kept forever; only the interest earned each year will be distributed to the foundation.

*Receives Grant For Purchase of New Gas Chromatograph*

The San Luis Obispo County Sheriff's Office has been awarded a \$94,772 grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) for a year-long program aimed at preventing deaths and injuries on our roadways through special enforcement and public awareness efforts. The grant received by San Luis Obispo County will aid in the city's ongoing effort to improve traffic safety and quality of life. San Luis Obispo County Sheriff's Office will use the funding as part of an on-going commitment to keep our roadways safe through both enforcement and education.

The Sheriff's Office chose to take on the responsibility of managing the operation of the Driving Under the Influence (DUI) program for the County of San Luis Obispo in 2014. The goal of the grant money is to reduce the number of people killed or injured in alcohol related traffic collisions in San Luis Obispo County. A new upgraded state of the art dual column Gas Chromatograph (GC), with headspace auto-analyzer will be purchased for use in the Forensic Alcohol Laboratory.

The Sheriff's Office Forensic Alcohol Laboratory (FAL), provides DUI blood sample testing to San Luis Obispo Police Department, Paso Robles Police Department, Atascadero Police Department, Morro Bay Police Department, Grover Beach Police Department, Pismo Beach Police Department, both Templeton and San Luis Obispo Highway Patrol divisions and State Parks and Recreation here in the County. Each of these agencies depends on the accuracy and reliability of the FAL to assist in reducing the number of deaths and injuries attributable to alcohol and drug involvement.

The grant will assist in efforts to deal with traffic safety problems and to reduce the number of persons killed and injured in traffic collisions. Alcohol-impaired driving fatalities increased from 28 percent in 2013 to 29 percent in 2014, as a percent of total fatalities. This number has remained virtually unchanged in the past four years. California is better than the national average of 31 percent.

Funding for this program is from the California Office of Traffic Safety through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Activities that the grant will fund include:

- Purchase a state of the art dual column GC with a headspace auto-analyzer.
- Purchase supplies necessary for the State Qualification of the new GC.
- Provide a temporary increase in staffing during the grant period.
- Strengthen the accuracy and reliability of Blood Alcohol Concentration testing.

Funding for this program is from the California Office of Traffic Safety through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

## *Christopher Meadows EMT Scholarship Recipients*

The Christopher Meadows Memorial EMS Education Fund has selected April Denny and Skyler Robertson as the latest recipients of an EMT scholarship awarded by the fund. Both awardees are currently enrolled in the EMT course at Cuesta College.

In addition to her EMT coursework at Cuesta, Denny currently attends California Polytechnic State University in San Luis Obispo and plans to graduate in June, 2018 with a degree in kinesiology. She spends her summers working as a National Park Service Ocean Lifeguard at the Golden Gate National Recreation Area in Marin County.

The first in her family to attend college, Robertson graduated from Cal Poly in 2013 with a degree in agribusiness. She has since developed a true passion for emergency medicine, and comes by it naturally, surrounded by a family of firefighters.

Denny and Robertson join a select group who recently received paramedic scholarships from the Meadows memorial fund. Those awardees include Jamie McRoy and Scott Sherrill from Cuesta College in San Luis Obispo; Evin Murphy from NCTI in Monterey; and Tyler Brandt and Candra Cooper from Foothill College in Los Altos.

### About the Fund

The Christopher Meadows Memorial EMS Education Fund was established by Taylor and Heather Tucker, co-workers of Meadows' at San Luis Ambulance immediately after Christopher's tragic death on May 24, 2009. Meadows was killed while on duty volunteering at Oceano Dunes for the SLO Sheriff's Department's Search and Rescue Unit. Christopher had planned to attend paramedic school in the fall of 2009, but never got that opportunity. Thirty paramedic and EMT scholarships have been awarded by the fund in its seven-year existence.

The fund is supported by individual contributions as well as donations and sponsorships from the following organizations: Cottage Health, King David's Masonic Lodge, Dignity Health, San Luis Ambulance, Central Coast Emergency Physicians, CEP America, CALSTAR, The Tribune, KSBY, Delta Sigma Pi, Paso Robles Professional Firefighters, Morro Bay Firefighters Association, San Luis Obispo City Firefighters, Association of SLO County Deputy Sheriffs, and Sun Buggy Fun Rentals.

### **Tobacco Sting**

The San Luis Obispo County Health Agency's Tobacco Control Program in coordination with the San Luis Obispo County Sheriff's Office completed countywide tobacco sales compliance check operations which ended on November 2, 2016. The enforcement activity utilized underage decoys to regulate illegal sales of tobacco products to minors and resulted in ten (10) businesses selling to a decoy (a 20.83% illegal sales rate) in the unincorporated areas of the county. The illegal sales rate increased from the last series of compliance operations. Tobacco compliance monitoring has been continuously in effect since 2012. For comparison purposes, the program's all-time high illegal sales rate is 25.93% with the low being 5.17%. On June 9, 2016, the minimum age for purchase of tobacco products in California raised from 18 to 21 years of age. The minimum purchase age increase to 21 was determined to have no impact on the violations that occurred.

The compliance checks focused on unincorporated communities including but not limited to San Miguel, Santa Margarita, Cambria, Cayucos, Los Osos, Avila Beach, Oceano and Nipomo. The incorporated cities within the county did not participate in these sting operations. With the assistance of four (4) local volunteer decoys (under age 21), forty-eight (48) tobacco retailer locations were visited throughout the county. Eleven (11) clerks from ten (10) of the forty eight (48) retailers illegally sold tobacco to the decoy, accounting for the 20.83% sales rate. One store had two clerks responsible for their participation in the sale, accounting for the discrepancy between eleven (11) clerks versus the ten (10) stores responsible. Under Penal Code § 308, it is a misdemeanor to sell tobacco products to anyone under the age of 21.

The ten (10) stores that engaged in the illegal sale of tobacco products to an underage 21 minor were as follows: Stores with no prior violations were: 1) JJ's Market, 2792 Halcyon Rd, Arroyo Grande; 2) Cayucos Gas & Mini Mart, 198 N. Ocean Ave, Cayucos; 3) Woodstone Marketplace, 6675 Bay Laurel Dr., Avila Beach. Second violation stores were: 4) Nipomo Marketplace Chevron, 501 W. Tefft, Nipomo; 5) San Miguel Chevron, 998 K Street, San Miguel; 6) San Miguel Market & Deli, 1299 Mission St, San Miguel, Shandon. Third violation stores were: 7) Paul's Liquor, 101 N Ocean Ave, Cayucos; 8) Bob & Jan's Bottle Shop, 2292 Main St, Cambria; 9) Cambria Chevron, 2194 Main St, Cambria. The following store sustained their fourth violation: 10) Oceano Market, 1711 Front St, Oceano.

Retail clerks with tobacco sales violations are issued a notice to appear and criminally prosecuted through Superior Court. By county ordinance, any business responsible for the violation is subject to administrative penalties including suspension of their ability to retail tobacco and a \$1000 fine for each offense. First and second offender business may elect to participate in a diversion program aimed at reducing licensing suspensions in exchange for onsite employee education and point-of-sale upgrades that use technology to prevent future sales.

The San Luis Obispo County Health Agency's Tobacco Control Program offers retailer training on how to refuse a sale, methods to identify an underage buyer and instruction on properly reading an identification card or driver's license. Members of the public or media with questions regarding the sale of tobacco products to minors are encouraged to call the Tobacco Control Program at (805) 781-5564.

### **Possession of Stolen Property Arrest**

On 12-6-16, Sheriff's Deputies responded to a report of a car burglary which had occurred on 11-23-16 in the 22000 block of El Camino Real in Atascadero. The victim, who works for an out of the area utility company, told Deputies that someone had smashed the window on his 2013 pickup truck and stolen a backpack containing his laptop and other work related equipment valued at more than \$14,000. The victim says he was contacted on 12-6-16 by a woman who says she was in possession of his backpack and offered to sell it back to him for \$250.

A Detective posing as the victim agreed to meet the woman at the corner of Spring Street and 4th Street in Paso Robles on 12-8-16. At that location the money was exchanged for the backpack. At that time, Detectives arrested the woman for felony possession of stolen property. The suspect has been identified as 52-year-old Kerry Lynn Allison of Paso Robles. She was booked into County Jail. Most of the stolen property has been recovered and returned to its rightful owner

### **WHAT IS THE NEED FOR A SHERIFF'S ADVISORY FOUNDATION—AREN'T OUR TAX DOLLARS ENOUGH?**

Unfortunately, no, YOUR TAX DOLLARS ARE NOT ENOUGH. San Luis Obispo County operates on a strict and structured budget that must be divided among all county services. With the continued growth of the county, there is not enough money in the budget to provide all of the sophisticated, costly and updated equipment and personnel needed.

Many of these Advisory Foundation groups are being successfully formed throughout the state to help augment and support law enforcement agencies. This is the expressed intent of this organization.


